HUNTLEY, ILL – Electrician by day and rockstar by night, hometown hero Pino Farina brings the northwest suburbs together through bi-weekly Facebook live performances. With a virtual jukebox of covers and original songs, Pino exudes a positive vibe, passion and talent that has helped fill these empty quarantine nights with lasting memories.

A pleasant distraction from our challenging times, Pino sometimes plays at his backyard firepit and this past Sunday police sirens can be heard in the distant background as a not so subtle reminder of our current reality. The community has rallied behind Pino and his performances with local venues like the (click the name to link) <u>RocHaus</u> [23] and <u>Sew Hop'd</u> [24] sponsoring and hosting performances on their websites.

After touring the country extensively with his award-winning band Pun?sapaya, Pino stepped away for a time to rediscover himself as an artist, songwriter and performer. In 2018, Pino released "Start Over Again" and has been enthusiastically welcomed back performing in different combinations with Pino Farina Band (solo, duo, or full). He is currently working on a new collection of songs and expects a Summer/Fall 2020 release.


Jeff Doles of HollywoodChicago.com recently talked with Pino Farina about his music career, his band and the overall journey during these challenging times.



HollywoodChicago.com: As a performer how has the quarantine changed the way you approach your music career?

Pino Farina: Honestly, I could not have imagined such a positive experience in such challenging and unprecedented times. The power of social media has really proven to be an incredible resource in allowing myself and so many other artists to virtually connect with captive fans, old and new.

Not only are the fans and new relationships made during this time, but the local musicians community itself have reached out to each other, and as a result that world has gotten smaller. To my disbelief, I have had the opportunity to discover some really incredible local talent and collaborate. It has formed a camaraderie between the community that I don't think any one of us had expected, and has allowed for more networking and exposure for all of us.

HollywoodChicago.com: Did you perform on Facebook live prior to the quarantine or is this new territory as a way to share your music? If not, what was the learning curve and what obstacles did you face?

Pino: I had never performed via a live stream before, and honestly was always a little afraid of the idea. When the social distancing started I was almost forced to try it. This seemed the only way to continue to keep my voice and guitar playing from withering away ... and continue to connect with an audience. Given the realities we're dealing with, it's truly been an escape valve.


My biggest obstacle has been the technical aspect of streaming. Early on, I started off just using my phone for audio and video, and trying to upgrade the quality of the streams by using broadcasting network software and incorporating audio recording software has been the real challenge. I am much more interested in the performance aspect, but I forced myself to understand the software, and definitely had a lot to learn. But like many other folks I wasn't working my day job, so it gave me a lot more time to teach myself and adapt.

HollywoodChicago.com: Do you think you'll continue to perform online as frequently once we clear the quarantine?

Pino: Moving forward, there will be great value for me as an artist, and also for live music lovers, to continue streaming. I am not sure the frequency will be as much, as I will be back to my full time day job and will continue to pursue playing live gigs at least two to three times a week ... which was the the rate I was going before the quarantine. There is a lot to juggle between family, work and music. One new way to continue and combine the streaming is to do one at a live gig. That was something I had never considered before, but maybe it would be a great way to reach the audience at home from those venues, for those unable to attend or not in the area.

HollywoodChicago.com: Do you feel more comfortable performing in front of an audience or in front of the camera? How does your performance change based on the medium you are using?

Pino: Interestingly enough, I will say that nerves and butterflies remain a constant, whether at a live venue or a stream. Moments before show time, I always get a little nervous and the adrenaline kicks in the same either way. I remember my first stream, back in mid March, I felt like a deer in headlights. But like anything else, the more exposure you have to any situation, the easier it becomes.

I was afraid that the connection to a real live audience would be lacking when doing the streams, but surprisingly it has still felt like we are all



in the same "room," partying together. I think the audience and performer have adapted in these times, where we can still feel a release and escape from reality through the music. The community feeling has been the most rewarding part of the whole experience.

HollywoodChicago.com: What has surprised you about the reaction to your Facebook Live performances? What have people commented on your wall or reached out to you directly to say?

Pino: The main thing I have taken away from the Facebook streams, and the reactions to them, is the positivity of it all ... the sense of community and connections I have been able to make. I have been blown away by the private messages from folks who are so appreciative and moved by the performances, and the importance of music in their lives. As a musician, knowing that you can positively change someone's minute, hour or day with our songs is honestly the ultimate goal and reward. I have been seriously grateful for those special moments that we have all shared together.

HollywoodChicago.com: Talk about one of your original songs. For example, what inspired you to write it?

Pino: During the quarantine, while on furlough from the company that I've worked at for over 20 years, I was gratefully able to spend more time focusing on family and music.

One evening, in late March, I was feeling the weight of our current situation and wrote a new song called <u>"What on Earth"</u> [25], which I recently released on my YouTube channel. I wrote in one evening, and then shared it with my bandmates. We were able to be socially distant and collaborate on the recording from our own home studios, and then put the completed track together. It is a song of uncertainty and unrest, that I believe many of us can relate to at this moment ... and maybe the moments that will be beyond this situation?

HollywoodChicago.com: You speak of music so reverently, how important was it for you during these very challenging times?

Pino: Music has always been and continues to be therapy and release for me. I think at this time, especially, when everyone has felt so distant and unable to socially interact. We couldn't enjoy the simple times of going out to bars and venues to enjoy the energy of live music, we are all hungry for that connection.

Before the quarantining hit the States, we were seeing YouTube videos of people across the world, for example in Italy, singing and dancing from their balconies while in quarantine. For me, it was emotional to see that interaction ... that innate feeling of communication, sharing common thoughts and fears. It's that energy and language of music that makes it universal, and allows it to be such a healing, healthy distraction in the rough times, to bring us all together.
